

Little Annie Witch Pocket Ornie

Approximately 9 inches tall when completed.

Material: Muslin, scraps black, scraps orange flannel, scraps off white flannel
Embroidery thread: Prim red (hair & nose), dark brown, black, off white, pink
Stuffing

- Paint: Black, white, wine (cheeks)
- Doll needle (3 or 5 inches long)
- Mechanical pencil
- card stock
- Extra thick black felt
- Small paint brushes
- Rope or jute (for pumpkin)
- Two small rusty bells
- One small rusty safety pin
- Two 1/4 inch black matte buttons (cat eyes)
- Grapevine wreath wire
- Wire cutters and pliers
- Hot glue gun and glue sticks

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Approximately 9 inches tall when completed.

Read through all directions before beginning.

Pocket:

1. Print & cut out pocket pattern. Trace on double muslin, pin; do NOT cut out. Sew on traced lines leaving open where indicated on pattern.
2. Turn top down about 1/4 inch and hand sew a running stitch with brown embroidery thread.
3. Stain with recipe and instructions given below.

Annie Witch:

1. Print and cut out Little Annie patterns including her dress pattern, arm pattern, and hair card.

Annie: Trace Little Annie on double muslin; do NOT cut out. Sew on traced lines being sure to leave open where indicated on pattern. Cut out about 1/4 inch away from sewn lines. Clip curves and turn. Stuff firmly and sew opening closed. Trace 2 arms on double muslin; do NOT cut out. Sew on traced lines being sure to leave open where indicated on pattern. Turn. Stuff lightly to stuffing line and sew opening closed. Attach to Little Annie where indicated on pattern. Stain with recipe and instructions given at the end of these directions.

2. Facial Features: Lightly dip the end of a small paintbrush into black acrylic paint and dot on her eyes. Let dry. Lightly dip the end of an even smaller paintbrush into whicker white paint and dot on the whites of the eyes. With a wooden or plastic ruler, trace on her eyebrows, eyelashes, and mouth. Thread a double strand of dark brown embroidery thread on doll needle and going in from the top of her head (this will be covered with her hair) go down and embroidery her eyebrows, eyelashes, and mouth with a simple backstitch. Print and cut out her nose pattern. Place on face where desired and pin in place with straight pins. Trace with mechanical pencil. Thread doll needle with a double strand of country red embroidery thread and going in from the top of her head (this will be covered with her hair) go down and embroider her nose with a satin stitch. Lightly drip a small paintbrush into Barn Red acrylic paint and pounce off most of the paint on a paper towel. Lightly swirl in her cheeks.

3. Hair: Print and cut out hair card on card stock. Wrap country red embroidery thread around hair card 20 times; slide off and set aside. Cut 3 pieces of country red embroidery thread about 2 inches long and thread onto a doll needle. Insert this in one of the hair spots indicated on head pattern, take the needle all the way through the head (from front to back) then bring the needle back around to the front and take it back through head leaving enough of a loop to insert hair into and leaving enough tails on both ends to pull to tighten. Lay the hair (that you just set aside) in the center of one of these loops and pull on

both tails to tighten, tie off. Do the same for the other two hair spots. Clip loops of hair and trim.

Dress:

1. Print and cut out dress pattern. Trace on double material being sure to place on fold where indicated on pattern; cut out.
2. With wrong sides together, sew shoulder and side seams.
3. Stain with recipe and directions given at the end of these directions.
4. Place on doll. Fold down neck about 1/4 inch and, with black embroidery thread, hand sew a gathering stitch around neck; pull to gather and tie off thread.

Witch Hat:

1. Print and cut out hat pattern.
2. Trace on single layer black material. Trace again on one layer extra thick black felt. Cut out both.
3. Laying the black felt on top of the black material, fold over evenly, pin and sew side seam. This is very thick so you may need to hand sew this closed which is what I did.
4. With black embroidery thread, whip stitch all around "brim" of hat.
5. Turn tip of hat down and tack down with a few stitches. Sew on rusty bell. (If you don't have a rusty bell, follow the "rusting" recipe and instructions given at the end of this pattern.)
6. Place hat on Annie and sew in place.

Pumpkin:

1. Print & cut out pumpkin pattern.
2. Trace on single layer orange flannel; cut out.
3. Hand sew a gathering stitch all around the pattern; pull to gather until almost all the way closed.
4. Stuff firmly with stuffing and sew shut. (This is the bottom)
5. Stain with recipe and directions given at the end of these instructions.
5. Thread a doll needle with a double strand of black embroidery thread. Bring the needle up through the center of the pumpkin, out the top and back down to the bottom; making sure the black embroidery thread is sectioning off the pumpkin. When you have gone completely around the pumpkin, tie off on bottom.
6. Stain some old rope or jute with recipe and instructions below. Pick apart the rope or jute (these are made up of several layers) and sew to center top of pumpkin.
7. Sew on rusty bell. (If you don't have a rusty bell, follow the "rusting" recipe and instructions given at the end of this pattern.)
8. Looking at the picture on the pattern, arrange the pumpkin in Annie's arms and sew in place.

Cat:

1. Print and cut out cat pattern. Trace on double layer black material; do NOT cut out.
2. Sew on traced lines; do NOT leave an opening.
3. Clip curves and cut out about 1/4 inch away from sewn lines.
4. Cut a small opening in back for turning.
5. Turn. Stuff firmly and sew opening shut.

6. Stain with recipe and directions given at the end of these instructions.
7. Print and cut out cat face pattern and trace on single layer off white flannel; cut out.
8. Center and sew to face with matching embroidery thread and a "whip" stitch pattern.
9. Sew buttons on for eyes.
10. Mark nose and whiskers. Thread doll needle with a double strand of pink embroidery thread. Embroider the nose using a satin stitch; go on down and embroider the mouth using a simple backstitch. With one strand of black embroidery thread, embroider the whiskers.
11. Sew cat in place on pocket (see picture).

Finish:

1. Place Little Annie in pocket and glue.
 2. Glue or sew cat in place (see picture).
 3. Cut a 7 inch piece of grapevine wreath wire and glue to inside back of pocket. You may need to glue Annie to front of wire to hide it.
 4. Print out tag on card stock and pin to Annie with a rusty safety pin.
 5. Cut a piece of grapevine wreath wire 20 inches long. Curl in a circle and glue to back.
- NOTE: In order for the ornie to hang correctly, glue the bottom of the circle of grapevine wreath to top back of pocket being sure to also glue the sides.

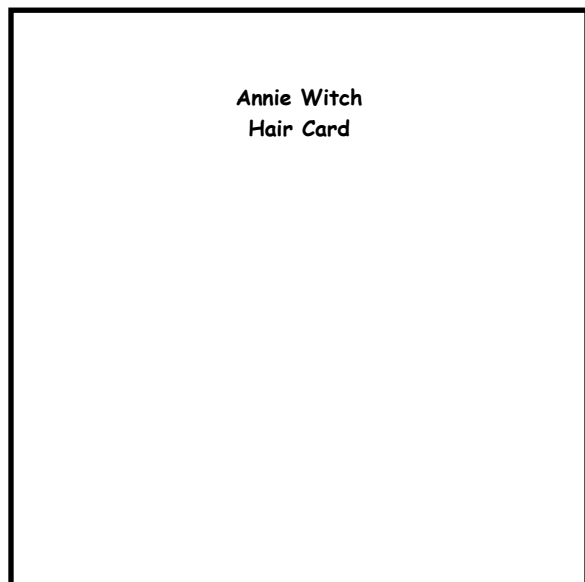
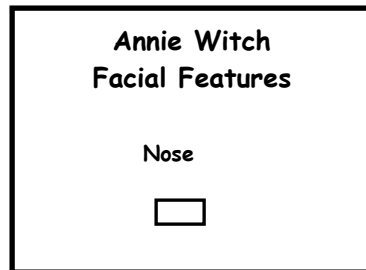
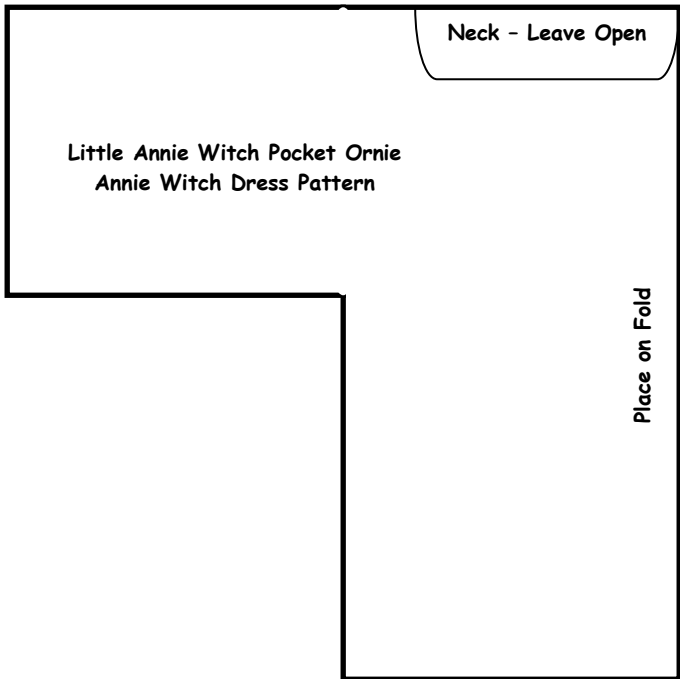
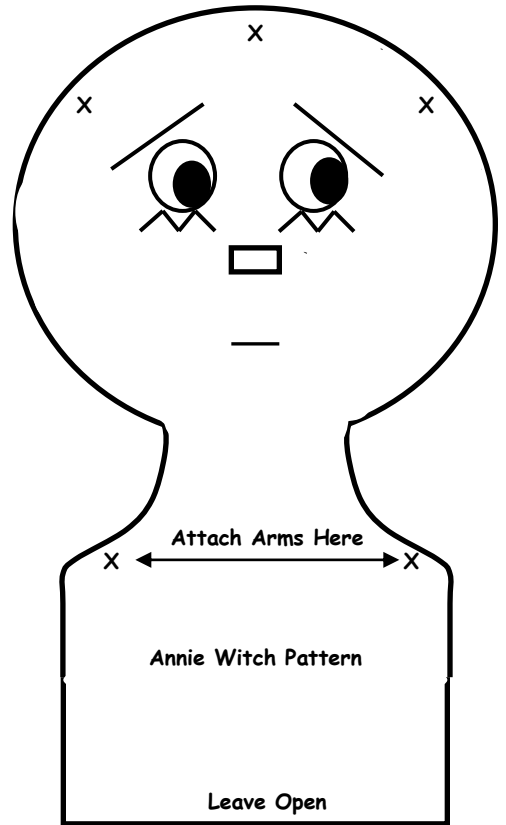
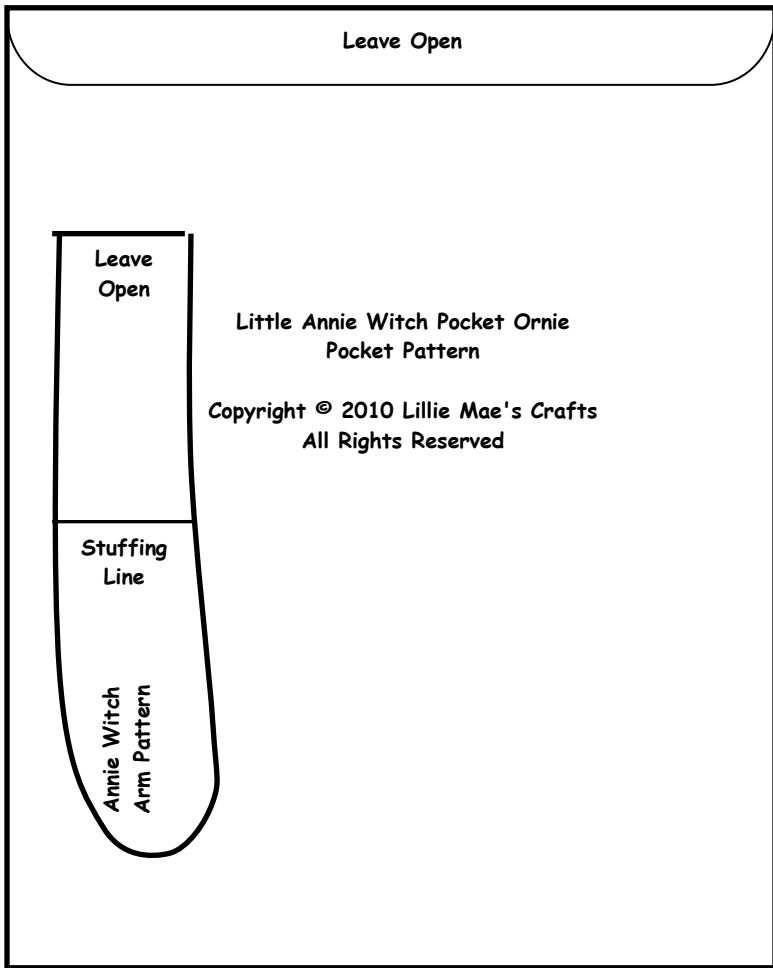
Staining: Combine $\frac{1}{4}$ cup instant coffee, 2 cups hot water, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup Vanilla extract and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon fragrance oil (Some of my preferred scents are cinnamon bun, sugar cookies, and vanilla) in a glass jar with lid. Shake for few minutes until thoroughly mixed. If the scent is not strong enough for your preference, add another $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon of fragrance oil and continue this until the scent is to your liking. However, I would suggest only adding $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon of fragrance oil each time because if you add too much and the scent is too strong for you, you will have to start over. Line an old cookie sheet with old rags and lay what you're staining here. With a sponge brush or spray bottle thoroughly coat. Bake for 10 minutes at 250 degrees. Check often as this can catch on fire. If you have to bake longer, only bake at 5 minute increments and always KEEP checking the oven. Store left over stain mixture in glass jar with lid for your next primitive project.

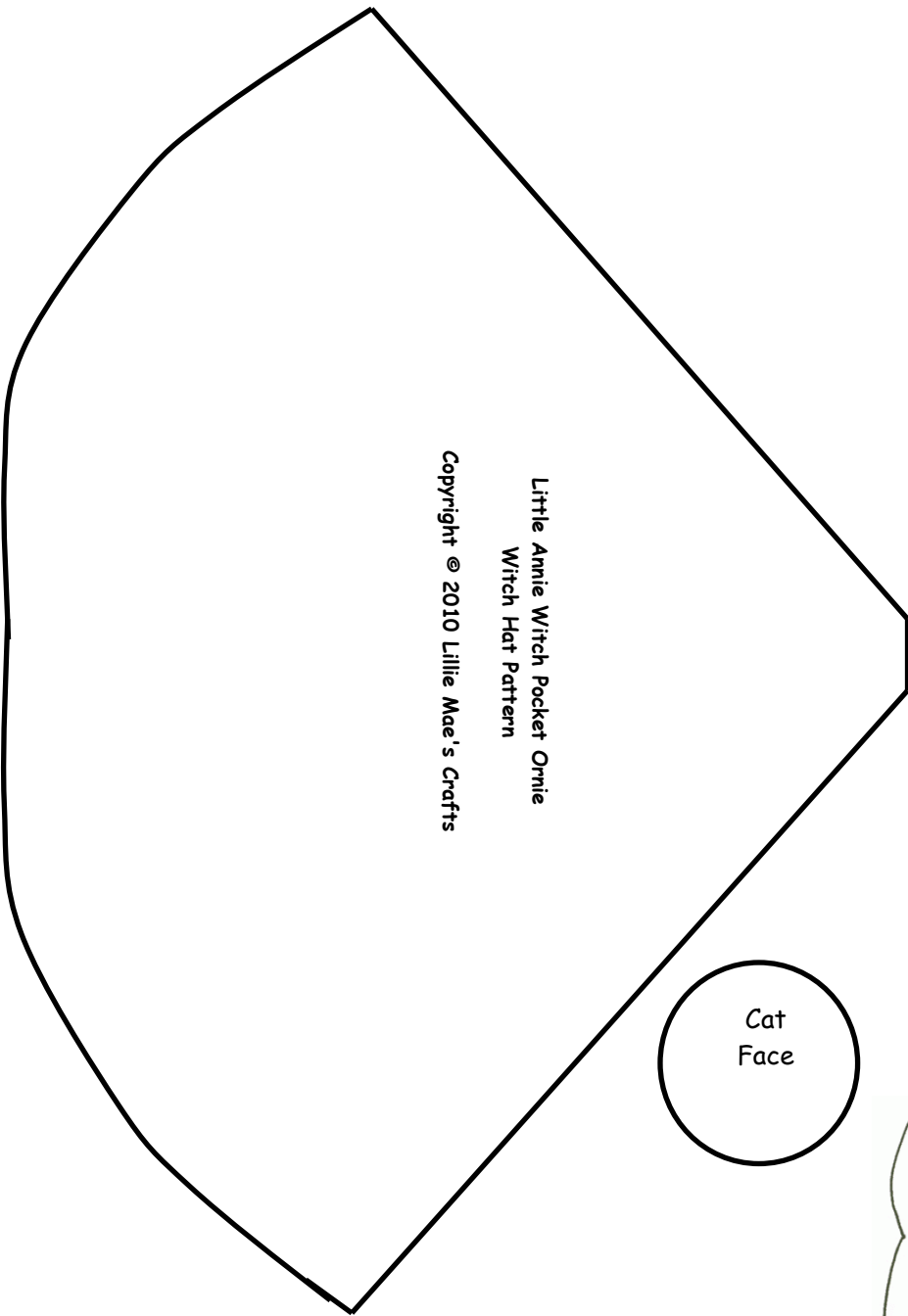
Rusting Recipe: Combine 2 cups white vinegar, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup peroxide and 2 tablespoons salt in a large plastic container; soak for 4 hours. Remove to paper towels, spritz with peroxide and spread salt on them. Let sit for another 2 hours. NOTE: This recipe calls for a large container as this recipe foams up pretty quickly.
